INTRODUCTION

The Riddell District Football Netball League is one of the oldest community football leagues in Australia with ties all the way back to 1872.

The League is currently made up of 26 clubs across Junior Boys, Junior Girls, Senior Men's and Senior Women's Football as well as Junior Netball and Senior Netball competitions.

The clubs elect an RDFNL Board of Directors to assist with:

- Setting the strategic direction of the league and its implementation, within the constitutional framework.
- Acting in the best interests of the league and its stakeholders at all times.
- Good governance and compliance.

In turn the Directors, through the Chairperson, delegate responsibility for day-to-day operations to the Chief Executive Officer.

- Overseeing the operations of the league.
- Ensuring member clubs and stakeholders are kept informed on all relevant matters.

The RDFNL Board of Directors and the Chief Executive Officer have developed a new strategic plan comprising 2025 through to 2028.

Member clubs and stakeholders are encouraged to review the plan and contribute to its further development.

PLANNING PROCESS


The Board of the Riddell District Football Netball League along with staff input and feedback have developed this Strategic Plan. This plan is to be a working document that will be updated as demand necessitates.

The Strategic Plan of the Riddell District Football Netball League is aligned with the priorities of the AFL Victoria Strategic Plan, to facilitate goal setting and optimum development and participation growth opportunities.

In that regard, the RDFNL is committed to achieving outcomes in line with AFL Victoria and Netball Victoria's Vision Statements.









THE PLAN

To provide direction for the development and administration of football and netball at senior and junior levels throughout the Riddell District Football Netball League and any potential growth areas.

The RDFNL has developed a Strategic Plan for the period 2025 - 2028.

A strong Strategic Plan will underpin the accountability it has to its member clubs and the direction it will take to achieve these goals:

- To the stakeholders of the RDFNL, whether playing, coaching, umpiring, volunteering or supporting – to ensure that their participation is an enjoyable and a rewarding experience.
- For sustaining, growing, developing and promoting football at all levels and the provision of the countless prospects that it has on offer both on and off the field.
- To ensuring that all clubs and the facilities it uses, are utilized to their full potential.

WHERE IS THE RDFNL NOW? (CONTINUED)

Four full time employees.

- Riddell Umpires Association is a separate entity who administer football umpiring across the league. The Association has experienced a decline in Umpires since 2015, down from 164 officiating Umpires in 2015 to 119 officiating Umpires in 2024.
- RDFNL supply RDFNL Panel Umpires across A B grade and 19 and Under netball competitions.

WHERE DO THE RDFNL WANT TO BE?

- 12 Senior Men & Women's Football Netball Clubs
- 12 Clubs with Under 19.5's, Reserves, Senior Women's and Senior Men's teams.
- 13 Clubs with five Divisions of Netball, A, B, C, D & 19U netball teams.
- Four Divisions of Girls/Women's Football
- Minimum of eight teams of Girls only teams in an Under 10 Competition.
- Minimum of six teams of Girls only teams in an Under 13 Competition.
- Minimum of six teams of Girls only teams in an Under 16 Competition.
- All 12 Senior Men's teams having a Senior Women's team plus Melton & Mt Alexander Falcons, 14 teams in RDFNL Senior Women's.
- 231 Junior football teams across eight age groups across 19 Divisions
- 60 x U9 teams (Wednesday & Sunday Competitions) all 18 Clubs who field U9 teams to have minimum three teams each with some having four.
 - 8 x U10 Girls only teams.
- 40 x U11 mixed teams (A, B, C & D) all 15 Clubs to have minimum two U11 teams with some having three.
- 36 x U13 mixed teams (A, B, C & D) all 15 Clubs to have minimum two U13 teams with some having three.
- 6 x U13 Girls only teams.
- 30 x U15 Boys teams (A, B & C) all 15 Clubs to have minimum one team with some having two or three.
- 6 x U16 Girls only teams.
- 25 x U17 Boys teams (A, B & C) all 15 Clubs to have minimum one team each with some having two.









WHERE DO THE RDFNL WANT TO BE? (CONTINUED)

- 179 Junior netball teams across seven age groups across 17 Divisions
- $35 \times 9 \times U$ mixed teams (A, B & C) with each Club having two teams and some having three.
- 35 x 11&U mixed teams (A, B & C) with each Club having two teams and some having three.
- 35 x 13&U mixed teams (A, B & C) with each Club having two teams and some having three
 - 10×13 &U Boys teams.
- 30 x 15&U Girls teams (A, B & C) with each Club having two teams.
 - 8 x 16&U Boys teams.
- 26 x 17&U Girls teams (A, B & C) with each Club having one team and most having two teams.
- Require additional staff with a minimum 40% split of women and gender diverse people.
- Financially sound and sustainable
- Umpiring operations. The Association to have 225 officiating Umpires.
- RDFNL supply RDFNL Panel Umpires across all five Senior Divisions of Netball as well as 17&U Competitions.

OPPORTUNITIES:

- Room for further growth in the Senior and Junior competitions in both Football and Netball
- Consolidating age groups in the Junior and Youth Girls competitions to retain players
- Finalise signatory process for Women and Girls Charter as well as Gender Equity & Inclusion Action Plan and Suicide Postvention Plan.
- Engage Junior clubs outside of the RDFNL to play in competitions they don't participate in
- Increase the commercial footprint of the RDFNL
- Advocate for improved facilities for member clubs
- Administer Riddell Umpires operations and game allocations

WEAKNESSES:

- Not present on all social media platforms to maximise reach. Majority of participants are Juniors who use social media the most of any age group.
 - The Junior fixture is not always suitable for Junior clubs with teams across multiple grades
- Depth of umpiring numbers to cater for a growing League participation

- Current junior girls football age groups.

- Not all facilities are inclusive of all genders contributing to unsafe match day environments



Statistics on the RDFNL's Growth since COVID-19


- Approximately 5040 participants in 2019 to approximately 5660 in 2024. This will continue to grow in 2025.
- Creation of Women's and Junior/Youth Girls competitions.
- Expanded Netball competitions with the introduction of 9 and Under and D Grade.
- Provided \$XXX for clubs through SCIF and Telstra Footy Country Grant programs to assist in increasing player numbers.
- Increased commercial footprint by \$73,000 through collaborative relationships with partners.
- Fielded an Under 13 Girls and Senior Women's Interleague teams for the first time in 2024.
- Increased accredited Football Coaches from XXX to 292 in 2024.

AUSKICK

Auskick and Superkick are the AFL's official junior game development program for 5-10 year olds and their families. Auskick is a national program which provides an environment where children of all abilities can achieve and reap the rewards of skill development, enhanced self esteem, social cooperation and grassroots sports participation.



JUNIOR COMPETITION

Junior Boys and Girls competitions for all age groups are offered by the Riddell District Football Netball League. All levels of skill are catered for through the grading process applied to the fixtures of the Junior competitions. The League runs Junior competitions from Under 9's through to Under 17's and Youth Girls.



REP PROGRAMS

Players are selected through the League
Junior Football and Netball competitions to
compete in an Under 13 Round Robin, and
the AFL Victoria Metro Junior Development
Series. This is the pinnacle of Junior
representation and can present
opportuninties with the Calder Cannons,
Western Jets, Bendigo Pioneers and AFL
club pathway and NGA programs.



COATES LEAGUE

State based elite Boys and Girls competitions that allow for a greater level of opposition. The Calder Cannons, Western Jets and Bendigo Pioneers are all programs that provide development progression opportunities for RDFNL Junior players. Games played across the whole state and this is the highest competition available to Junior players of the League.

opportunities to be talent identified and
invited to the state pathway academies.



STATE PATHWAY

State based elite netball training and competition that allow for a greater level of opposition. This program provides development progression opportunities for RDFNL Junior players to make the transition to National teams. Games played across the whole state and this is the highest competition available to Junior players of the League.

DEVELOPMENT


Develop a growth strategy including the identification of opportunities for new clubs/teams.
